Have you ever had something so wonderful happen to you that you just couldn't wait to tell someone about it? Of course you have! Your engagement, the birth of a child, recovery from an illness, promotion at work: all these are instances of GOOD NEWS you just can't wait to share. Any time something good happens in our lives we are compelled to share this with others.

Do you know that this makes you an evAN-GEList?

That's right. Sharing good news about yourself, or about someone you know makes you an evANGEList. You see, the Greek word for "good news" is ευαγγλιον, or "gospel." [For those of us who aren't brushed up on Koine Greek, the English transliteration of this is "euangelion." This is also akin to theword we use for a messenger of God - "ANGEL"!] One who proclaims such good news is an ευαγγελιστησ, "evANGEList." Or, an ANGEL, if you prefer. So, every time you share some bit of good news with someone, you are being an evANGEList. And I bet you thought you didn't have it in you!

If, then, we are so willing to share good news with others, why are we so reticent to share the best news of all, the Good News of Christ in the world? I think that part of the answer lies in our perception of what an evANGEList is.

Turn on the TV at anytime of the day or night and chances are, on some channel, there'll be some preacher screaming to you that you need to be saved or else the devil will haul you away to the nether regions of hell. Or there's someone asking you to call in with your pledge of \$\$\$\$ in order for the gospel to reach the poor of some part of the world you've never heard of. These images are not the only way to do evANGELism.

In fact, they're not even a good way to do evAN-GELism.

The best context in which to do evANGELism is the kind of one-on-one sharing that occurs when two or three people come together and share their hopes and dreams, frustrations and failures, in an atmosphere of acceptance and love. Engaging with people in their daily life, that's what it's all about. St. Paul knew this better than anyone. As the evANGEList par excellence he was adept at engaging people where they lived. He stayed in one place for a period of time, got to know the leaders of the community and shared with them how the good news of Christ had changed him from a persecutor of the Christians to its foremost proclaimer. I don't think he yelled at folks to get them to believe though he could get somewhat animated in his discourse! And he may have asked for donations—to be sent to the Church in Jerusalem. But, he was an evangelist, one who actively shared the Gospel of Christ to those who would hear.

There are other reasons why many of us cringe at the mention of the words "evANGELism" or "evANGEList." It seems to me that we use most of them as an excuse not to do evANGELism ourselves. We need to let go of such images as TV preachers, door-knocking-bible-thumpers, street evangelists, and the like, if we are to really engage in the work of Christ by sharing the good news of salvation

In a number of languages the expression 'the gospel' or 'the good news' must be rendered by a phrase, for example, 'news that makes one happy' or 'information that causes one joy' or 'words that bring smiles' or 'a message that causes the heart to be sweet.' How many people this Christmastide will you talk to about what you got from Santa Claus? How many people will you talk to about Christ? Of the two, which makes you the most happy, or brings more smiles, or causes sweetness in your heart? Of the two, which is the real good

news?

Be an ANGEL this new year. Share the GOOD NEWS of Christ in your life!

St. John's Outreach Committee met Sunday, December 4, and opened with prayer.

The Mitten Tree gathered enough gloves, scarves, and hats to fill a Cub Foods cardboard box. Serving our community is something that we care about at St. John's Episcopal. When the Outreach Committee reaches out to give on behalf of St. John's we make a difference in many lives. The donations tell the community that we care. To each person who provided something for the mitten tree—ThankYou!

After reviewing the requests for donations we settled on contributing to three different non-profit organizations.

ECHO Food Shelf. Increased demand for food from ECHO means an increased challenge for ECHO to continue to meet the need. Money purchases more food than a direct food donation so it was decided to donate \$100.

HeatShare. The Salvation Army's HeatShare program helps families in need by providing year-round emergency assistance for their heating and utility bills. Funds are used for natural gas, oil, propane, wood, electricity and furnace repairs. This program is a last resort for those

who have no other resources available to see them through the winter. St. John's wants to help its community so the Outreach Committee donated \$100.

Running Strong for American Indian Youth.

A letter from Running Strong requesting a donation stated that \$15 would purchase a coat, \$36 would purchase a 25-lb. food box that will feed a family of four for one week, and \$7.54 will purchase a blanket. We donated \$50.

The Outreach committee meets the first Sunday of each month. Participation in this committee is open to all members of St. John's. Join us in caring for the needs of others.

Notice of 2012 Annual Meeting

Hear Ye! Hear Ye! The right and honorable 2012 Annual Meeting of the Parish Church of St. John the Evangelist will be held on **SUNDAY**, 29 JANUARY, during 10.30am worship. In order to come together as a full congregation, we will only have one service of worship on this day.

We have been holding our Annual Meetings the past several years during the Offertory because this is when we present to

God those parts of our lives—treasure mainly, but also our time and talents—as a "reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice" (to quote the Eucharistic Prayer). Isn't that what we're doing at our Annual Meetings:

Presenting to God the work of our labors in the vineyard, planning for more harvest, giving thanks to God for all we are? Of course!

So, here's the plan:

- 1. Send in your Annual Reports to <stjohns@hickorytech.net> by 10 January (all ministry groups in the parish will need to do this). If your group is responsible for any budgetary items, please include a budget report with your narrative.
- 2. Pick up an Annual Report [they'll be ready by 22 January).
- 3. Come to the 1030am worship on 29 January.
- 4. Bring a dish to share at the potluck following worship.
- 5. Give thanks to God for another year of faithful ministry!



Vestry Finalizes Proposed Budget

The Vestry marked up the final budget proposal for the upcoming annual meeting and continued to struggle to put together a slate of officers for the coming year at their December 18th meeting.

Members heard the good news that income from the 52 pledges in hand was up more than \$5000 from last year, but that 11 pledges are outstanding and some pledging families have been lost due to death and relocation. Though the financial report showed a healthy improvement in income from the previous month and the prospect of returning some of the capital fund transfers required earlier, operating deficits continue. Though the capital fund has been substantially buoyed by estate income recently deposited there, only about \$4300 remains of capital funds on hand at the beginning of the year. The proposed budget for the coming year estimates expenses at about \$24,000 more than income from the coming year. About \$30,000 in operating funds this year have come from the capital fund (\$21,700) and draws on the Pooled Investment Fund (\$8900).

The on-going shortfall of revenue undergirded most of the discussions at the meeting. The vestry desperately wants to answer the question where the funds are going to come from to fill that gap in 2012.



TREASURER'S REPORT NOVEMBER 2011

Total income for the month was \$24,735 and the total expenses were \$12,946. We are hoping to transfer some funds from the General account back into the Capital account in December. We have received \$37,143 from Kiyo Suymatsu's life insurance policy. This money has been deposited into the Capital account pending the Vestry's decision on how to use it. The current balances in our various accounts are as follows: General Fund \$12,914; Capital Account \$41,869; and Property Escrow Account \$19,031.

While each option supports education and community building in an area of extreme poverty, the program receiving the most votes is Rain for the Sahel and Sahara in Niger.



RAIN is an exceptional program supporting nomadic schools where children need food to eat and teachers to teach them. It accomplishes this in the Sahara desert's extreme climate and harsh conditions, helping the nomads find access to food, water, and livelihoods that support their schools. It's a model that works to develop community after community where other nonprofits are not present and in a way that incorporates the nomads' traditional lives and customs.

Those of us on the MDG/Fair Trade team look forward to watching this program in 2012 and sharing with you more about the country, the RAIN program and how our donation is being used. Good News

Based on a story from KEYC-TV

Starting January 1 Blue Earth County residents will be able to recycle even more.

Formerly only plastics one and two in a bottle form could be recycled, but now "you can recycle numbers one through seven—meaning tubs and other small containers can be out at the curb. The plastic number is located on the bottom of a container surrounded by arrows.

Recycling Coordinator Jean Lundquist says, 'A lot of these items were already making it into the recycling stream, and they did have to be picked out manually, and now they will be picked out mechanically and used instead of thrown away.'

Blue Earth County recycling is handled by the city of Mankato. Homes that have LJP pick up their trash and recycling can still only recycle number one and two plastics."

Greetings from Pueblo Colorado! Paul and I are getting settled at our new house at 3821 Elk Lane and enjoying Colorado sunshine. I'm glad to be back in my native state, where I can see mountains every morning.

The parish that has called me to be their rector is great! It's a little smaller than St. John's but bigger than my previous parish in Fairmont. 
